Did that person like it a bunch?




Have you ever seen someone who was crying and sad?

Sometimes they need help getting through doors.




If you were a dinosaur,

Dakota is this special dinosaur's name.


If you ask him a question once,

you may find he's a good dancer.








He may repeat the same words once or twice, but when you understand him, you may see that he's really nice!

Datoka may act in a way that you don't understand, like when he keeps moving his hands.


Sometimes Dakota may cry and scream, like you would if you had a bad dream.

of the year was getting close, the time that every dinosaur loves the most.





They couldn't understand why he thought the rain was going to fall. But, what the other dinomates couldn't see is that Dakota loved to study weather history.




While all the others wouldn't pay attention, Hope remembered something her Grand Dino mentioned:



Now Hope knew she had to find a way to get Dakota's message across today.










Have you heard,

"So, you can see, all of us do different things well. Please let's listen to what Dakota has to tell."




The dinomates decided to trust, so they went to their teacher so they could discuss.

She looked to Dakota who said,


"We'll be fine after two."
